 - Long Lake 58 First Nation is a signatory to Treaty 9, which provides rights to hunting, trapping and fishing throughout the treaty area.
 - Long Lake 58 First Nation's reserve (Long Lake No. 58) is about 350 kilometres south from the Project.
 - Long Lake 58 First Nation is part of the Matawa First Nations, the Chiefs of Ontario, the Union of Ontario Indians, and the Nishnawbe Aski Nation.
 - Long Lake 58 First Nation's Land Code came into force April 1, 2017 under the *First Nations Land Management Act*, Schedule 2.
