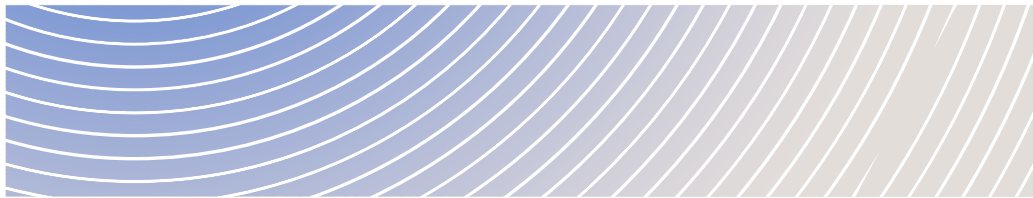

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1. Introduction

On 6 May 2024, the Impact Assessment Agency of Canada (IAAC) issued an opinion that an impact assessment is warranted for the Novador Gold Mine Project (the Project).

The Public Participation Plan was developed by IAAC to set out opportunities for participation during the impact assessment process (the process). This plan is also designed to be flexible so that IAAC can modify the approaches described in the plan in order to take account of the progress of the assessment.

2. Project description

Probe Gold Inc. is proposing the construction and operation of a new open-pit and underground gold mine, located about 25 kilometres east of Val-d'Or, in Quebec. As proposed, the Novador Gold Mine Project would have a maximum ore production capacity of 24,000 tonnes per day with an estimated lifespan of 12.5 years. The project would include an ore processing plant, access roads, waste rock and overburden piles, and a tailings storage facility.

3. Objectives of public participation

The Public Participation Plan was developed through consultations during the Planning phase and outlines the various ways a participant may provide input and engage in the process, including for those most likely affected by the Project. The following objectives for public participation reflect the views heard during the Planning phase:

- Members of the public who wish to participate in the impact assessment have the opportunity to do so in an informed manner, with the necessary information;
- IAAC put in place conditions conducive to the participation of a range of people, including youth, women, seniors and groups with diverse identity profiles;
- The public participates from the outset. Its participation continues on a regular and frequent basis, at each key stage of the process;
- The public participates in the development or revision of key documents, including the Plan, the [Tailored Impact Statement Guidelines](#) (Tailored Guidelines), the proponent's Summary of the Impact Statement, the Impact Assessment Report and Potential Conditions;

- AAC informs the proponent of concerns raised by interested parties; and
- Public views heard throughout the process are documented and inform decision-making.

4. Identification of participants

The appended list includes communities, organizations and other stakeholders identified by IAAC as potentially interested in the project, or who have expressed an interest in participating in the project's impact assessment.
